Children and youth living with HIV grapple with several medical, emotional and social challenges. Access to antiretroviral treatment contributes significantly to their capacity to live healthy lives. However, this is strongly dependent on the cooperation of the young person and his/her family, at least 95% adherence to treatment and social and educational support to the affected family.

Sentebale has developed a psychosocial support programme that strengthens the capacity of adolescents and their families to cope at health facilities in Lesotho. The programme uses children's clubs, caregiver sessions and camps facilitated by trained medical staff and youth volunteers from the community of the adolescents.

In this workshop session, programme coordinators are to share the intervention Sentebale has used in Lesotho for more than five years to work with adolescents and their caregivers and a sample activity of how they work with children at clubs and caregiver support sessions.

Young girls (aged ~13-24) in Nairobi slums are commonly forced into sex work in exchange for reprieve from financial debts. Young sex workers have no economic power, poor education, little to no access to health services and harm reduction materials, and have multiple concurrent sex partners of varying ages. All of the aforementioned factors increase their HIV risk.

Samantha Brown is a facilitated theatrical performance that tells the story of a girl who is sold to a pimp at a secret auction in exchange for debt relief. In Nairobi, this dramatic piece is performed in a variety of free and open community



settings in order to encourage and recruit girls, who may relate to Samantha Brown, to participate in U-Tena's Kuza project. Kuza is a "girls only" project facilitated by female peer educators who provide monthly life skills workshops, sexual health education and support.

HIV prevalence in Jamaica is particularly high among men who have sex with men (MSM) due to the underground nature of the community and the history of stigma and discrimination it has faced. As part of a long running initiative to target marginalized groups, The Ashe Company has implemented several innovative, edutainment behaviour-change HIV-targeted programmes throughout the Caribbean, using Ashe's unique EIC (Excitement, Involvement, Commitment) methodology to provide support for HIV prevention among several populations. 'In, Over and Out': Red Ribbon Diary series was designed to reach the depths of the MSM community, improve risk perception of HIV/AIDS as well as empower MSM, encouraging healthy choices for MSM and MSM people living with HIV (PLHIV). The Ashe Company will conduct a 45-minute edutainment musical presentation that addresses current HIV issues among MSM and transgender people in the Caribbean. This musical provides practical rights-based approach solutions for dealing with human rights advocacy, empowerment of young MSM, and proper care and treatment for young people living with HIV, including psychosocial support.

Lost in Love is the most recent iteration of Timothy Bartsch's preeminent musical work, 'Southern Time'. As he serenades through song of how he contracted HIV and what living with it has been like for him or the past 20 years, he accompanies himself with cello and keyboard. Timothy identifies as a heterosexual male, but living with HIV has torn apart previous entrenched, myopic and limited definitions of masculinity for him.

Tim also has a physical disability. He nearly died from the consequenses of AIDS in 2009, suffering permanent consequences, though he does not let these issues get him down anymore.

Victor is a 5-minute video that was produced based on formative research to encourage recently diagnosed gay men to seek HIV care. The formative phase consisted of indepth interviews with men receiving antiretroviral treatment. The video focuses on the barriers and facilitators these men had before deciding to start therapy. Some of these were: the long-term benefits of treatment, decreasing the negative attitude towards medication, the process of acceptance of the infection, motivating a new beginning, showing life as a couple, and the importance of finding emotional support. Similarly, other key elements were talking about the confidentiality of the health facility, showcasing the people working there and focusing on a story developed around a couple, showing that love is always possible regardless of HIV status.

South Africa undertook its first National Stigma Index Survey among 10 700 PLHIV in 18 districts across South Africa, the largest of its kind in the world. TB was also included in this survey for the first time. Based on the Stigma Index results, the South African National AIDS Council (SANAC) launched a national campaign to address social perceptions that continues to fuel stigma and discrimination against people living with HIV. The foundation of the campaign is real people and their stories, told in a series of short films that are honest, joyous, heartbreaking and real. Creating an enabling environment for all Young Key Populations-Young People Living with HIV to meaningfully participate equally in all SRHR/HIV programs in improving their Health

Open discussion with seniors youths guiding young people leaders. It is estimated that five million young people aged 15-24 and two million adolescents aged 10-19 are living with HIV. Yet young people most affected by HIV including those living with HIV, young sex workers, young men who have sex with men, young transgender people, and young people who use drugs, and these are the preknown Young key population groups (YKPs) in Uganda typically are unable to access and utilize comprehensive health services which meet both their HIV prevention and treatment needs as well as their sexual reproductive health needs. In addition, young people affected by HIV are often not welcome to participate in policy and program design and implementation, or do not feel comfortable doing so because of structural factors (such as stigma, taboo and discrimination based on age, gender, HIV status, and sexual orientation) or because of perceived lack of knowledge, skills, or abilities. The purpose of this concept is to both to strengthen on the already existing interventions for young people to participate in the different processes and countries on making the one common voice of YPLHIV in Africa, and to help identify and build the knowledge, skills, and abilities that they feel they need in order to meaningfully participate and to advocate for the realization of their sexual and reproductive health and rights/HIV.
